FROM PALM SUNDAY TO THE EMPTY TOMB A HOLY WEEK DEVOTIONAL

This month, we celebrate the resurrection of our Savior Jesus! The week leading up to Easter is known in the Christian Church as "Holy Week." The events of this week follow Jesus' ministry in the days leading up to the cross, and ultimately, to His victory over sin, death, and the grave. Each of these days are significant to our faith, and to our understanding of God's great love for us. As we draw closer to Easter, we are invited to reflect on Jesus' life, sacrifice, and love. I pray this devotional helps you draw closer in relationship with Christ and take steps to deepen your faith.

Palm Sunday: The King's Arrival (Matthew 21:1-11)

Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey while the crowds praised Him. The shouts of "Hosanna!" rang out as people welcomed Jesus as their Messiah. They laid palm branches and their cloaks before Him as a royal welcome. Yet, Jesus did not arrive as the type of king they expected. The Israelites hoped for a political revolutionary to overthrow their Roman rulers. Instead, Jesus came as a humble Savior, offering peace and salvation to all who believe. Just a few days later, many of these same voices would cry out, "Crucify Him!"

How often do we expect God to act a certain way, only to be surprised by His true purpose? Jesus' triumphal entry challenges us: do we follow Jesus only in times of celebration, or will we walk with Him through suffering as well?

Reflect & Pray

- Imagine yourself in the crowd. Would you have recognized Jesus as your King? How can you welcome Him as King of your life every day? - Are there areas in your life where you expect Jesus to work one way, but He's leading differently?

- Pray for a heart that's open and welcoming to Jesus' guidance in every season.

Monday: Cleansing of the Temple (Matthew 21:12-17)

Jesus entered the temple, finding it filled with merchants exploiting worshippers. In an act of righteous indignation, He overturned their tables, declaring, "My house shall be called a house of prayer, but you are making it a den of robbers" (v. 13). Jesus' cleansing of the temple was not out of frustration or mere anger. Instead, this shows Jesus' passion for sincere worship and honest practices. Jesus desires purity in our lives and in the way we worship, not allowing distractions or sinful desires to pull our attention away from Him.

Reflect & Pray

- What tables does Jesus need to overturn in your heart?
- Ask God to reveal any distractions or attitudes hindering true worship in your life.
- What steps can you take to make more space for prayer and time with God this week?

Tuesday: Teaching in the Temple (Matthew 22:34-40)

As Jesus taught in the temple, some of the religious leaders asked, "What is the greatest commandment?" Jesus replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind... And you shall love your neighbor as yourself." The mission of God throughout history can be summarized by these two commands. God's desire for His people to be in relationship with Him, and to share His love with those around us, is our highest calling.

As opposition grew against Jesus' ministry, He remained focused on loving God and loving others. When we love God fully, our love for others naturally follows. Jesus' words call us to examine our priorities are we truly loving as He commanded?

Reflect & Pray

- Are there areas where your devotion is divided? Consider how you can love God with your whole heart, soul, mind, and strength.

- Ask God to put someone on your heart who needs to experience Christ's love through you. Pray for the strength to love them sacrificially like Jesus did.

Wednesday: Betrayal of a Friend (Matthew 26:1-5, 14-16)

Judas made his infamous deal - to betray Jesus in exchange for thirty pieces of silver. Outwardly, Judas looked like all the other disciples; yet inwardly, his heart was divided. Betrayal doesn't always happen in dramatic scenes. Duplicity is often found in the small compromises and slow drift away from the things of God. We need to guard our lives against the divided loyalties that seek to pull us away from living for Christ.

Reflect & Pray

- Are there areas you struggle with divided devotion?

- What steps can you take to guard your heart and stay faithful? Ask God for a heart fully surrendered to Him.

Thursday: The Servant King (John 13:1-20)

On the night of the Last Supper, Jesus did something shocking - He washed His disciples' feet. Through this humble act, Jesus demonstrated that true leadership is found through serving others. Jesus then said, "I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done for you." While many people seek positions of power and social status, Jesus calls us to follow His example of humility, love, and sacrificial service.

Reflect & Pray

Are there areas in your life where pride prevents you from serving others?
How can you share Jesus' example of humility and service through your actions today?
Pray for God to help you develop a servant's heart, willing

to love and serve as Christ has shown.

Friday: Redemption through the Cross (Luke 23:32-47)

As Jesus hung on the cross, He spoke these words: "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." In His suffering, Jesus extended grace - even to those crucifying Him. Jesus' final words, "It is finished" (recorded in John 19:30) were not a cry of defeat, but a declaration of victory! The debt of humanity's sin was paid in full! Because of the finished work on the cross, those who trust in Christ are forgiven, redeemed, and restored. His sacrifice demands our lives be surrendered in gratitude and in worship.

Reflect & Pray

- Spend time reflecting on the depth of Jesus' sacrifice. Take some time to pray, thanking God for the sacrifice of His Son Jesus for all the sins of the world.

- How does Christ's example inspire you to forgive others in your own life? Ask God to show you people in your life that you need to forgive, as Jesus forgave.

Saturday: Stunned Silence (Matthew 27:57-66)

Saturday was a day of silence. Jesus was in the tomb. His followers were heartbroken, confused, and filled with grief. The disciples wrestled with the reality that the person they'd followed the past few years had been killed. Yet, even in the waiting, God was at work. The story wasn't over. God had something incredible in store the resurrection!

Reflect & Pray

- When have you struggled to see God's bigger plan in a difficult situation? Ask God for the hope to believe in His promises.

- How can you learn to rest in God's presence even when He seems quiet? Pray for a heart of patience to trust His timing, even in the waiting.

Resurrection Sunday: The Empty Tomb (Matthew 28:1-10)

Early in the morning, the women went to Jesus' tomb and found it empty! The angel declared, "He is not here; for He has been raised, just as He said." The resurrection changes everything!

Jesus' victory over death means we, too, have victory. As Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 15:54-55, 57, "Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?...Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

No matter our past, our struggles, or our failures, we have access to the gift of new life in Him. The tomb was empty - Jesus is risen! His victory over death provides new life and unshakable hope. Because He lives, we can face tomorrow with confidence, hope, and eternal assurance!

Reflect & Pray

- How does Christ's resurrection impact your faith and daily life?
- Rejoice in the truth that, because He lives, all Christ-followers have the promise of hope and victory!
- Ask God to renew your boldness to share His Good News with others.

As we journey through the events of Holy Week, let us draw closer in relationship to our Savior Jesus Christ. May our devotion and time with the Lord this week draw us closer to His heart for us, and transform our lives. I pray each of us will accept Jesus' invitation to walk with Him - not just to the cross, but into resurrection life. *O*

IRREFUTABLE PROOF WHY THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST CHANGES EVERYTHING

Few claims in human history are as bold or as consequential as the resurrection of Jesus Christ. If true, it validates everything Jesus said and did, proving Him to be the Son of God. If false, Christianity crumbles and fails completely. The Apostle Paul acknowledged this reality: "And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins" (1 Cor. 15:17, ESV).

Skeptics have long sought to dismiss the resurrection deriding those who believe, but the evidence remains overwhelming. As Dr. Gary Habermas, one of the foremost scholars on the resurrection, has demonstrated, even the most critical historians acknowledge certain historical facts surrounding the event. These facts, known as the "minimal facts" approach, provide a compelling case for belief. When weighed honestly, the resurrection stands as an irrefutable truth that changes everything—our faith, our future, and our very purpose in life.

THE HISTORICAL CASE FOR THE RESURRECTION

Any serious historical criticism must grapple with several key facts that even non-Christian scholars widely accept:

1. Jesus of Nazareth was crucified under Pontius Pilate. Roman crucifixion was a brutal and public execution, meticulously designed to ensure death. The notion that Jesus merely "swooned" and later revived has been debunked by medical and historical research. Jesus's death by crucifixion is historically certain.

2. Jesus' tomb was found empty.

If Jesus' body had remained in the tomb, Christianity would have been instantly discredited. Yet, even the Jewish authorities never produced a body to disprove the resurrection claim. Instead, they claimed the disciples stole it—a claim that, although absurd, admits the tomb where Jesus was laid was indeed empty. 3. Eyewitnesses testified to seeing the risen Christ. Paul records that Jesus appeared to over 500 people at one time (1 Cor. 15:6). These were not hallucinations—hallucinations do not happen to groups of people simultaneously. Moreover, Jesus appeared to many other eyewitnesses, all who were willing to suffer and die rather than recant their testimony.

4. The radical transformation of the disciples.

Before the resurrection, the disciples were fearful and in hiding. Afterward, these same men boldly proclaimed the gospel, even under threat of death. Peter, who denied Jesus three times to save himself from sharing Jesus's fate, later stood before the same authorities who crucified Christ and declared His resurrection (Acts 4:10-12). What changed? Their unwavering conviction that they had seen the physically risen Lord.

ALTERNATIVE THEORIES AND THEIR FLAWS

Some argue that the disciples fabricated the resurrection story. However, fabrications collapse under persecution—people don't willingly die for something they know to be false. Others suggest the appearances of Jesus were mere visions. Yet, visions do not account for the empty tomb, nor do they explain physical interactions like Thomas touching Jesus' wounds (John 20:27) or Jesus consuming food (Luke 24:42-43 & John 21:1-14).

Modern apologists Tim Barnett of Stand to Reason and Wesley Huff both argue that the best explanation for all the historical evidence is the simplest one: Jesus truly rose from the dead. The weight of historical, logical, and theological reasoning makes this conclusion inescapable.

WHY THE RESURRECTION CHANGES EVERYTHING

1. It Proves Jesus Is Who He Claimed to Be

Jesus repeatedly predicted His resurrection (Matt. 16:21, John 2:19-22). If He remained in the grave, He would have been a liar or a lunatic. But because He rose, we must take His words seriously—including His claim to be the Son of God (Mark 14:60-62).

2. It Guarantees Our Own Resurrection

Paul connects Christ's resurrection with our future hope: "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Cor. 15:20). Because Jesus conquered death, those who trust in Him will be raised to eternal life through Him and with Him.

3. It Demands a Response

If Jesus rose from the dead, neutrality is not an option. Craig Groeschel once said, "If a man predicts his death and resurrection and pulls it off, I'm going with whatever that guy says" (*The Christian Atheist*, 2010). The resurrection is not just an academic debate—it is the central claim of Christianity that demands our faith and allegiance.

4. It Confirms That Everything Jesus Said Is True

The resurrection does not just prove that Jesus is divine—it validates every claim He ever made. If Jesus can defeat death, then His words carry the weight of ultimate authority. When He says, *"Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away"* (Matt. 24:35), we can trust Him completely.

 His Teachings Are Trustworthy – Jesus' moral teachings, His instructions on love, forgiveness, and righteousness, are not just wise sayings; they are divine truth. The Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5-7) is not merely good advice—it is the blueprint for kingdom living, backed by the authority of the risen Christ.

- His Promises Are Secure Jesus promised rest for the weary (Matt. 11:28), peace beyond understanding (John 14:27), and eternal life for those who believe in Him (John 10:28). The resurrection guarantees that these promises are not empty words but realities secured by His victory over death.
- His Warnings Must Be Taken Seriously If Jesus rose from the dead, then His warnings about sin, judgment, and eternity cannot be ignored. He spoke of the consequences of rejecting Him (John 3:18, Matt. 25:46). The resurrection affirms that our response to Jesus has eternal significance.

In short, because Jesus rose, we can fully trust every word He spoke. His resurrection validates His identity, His message, and His mission, giving us complete confidence in all that He has revealed.

THE UNSHAKABLE FOUNDATION OF FAITH

The renowned pastor and theologian John Piper reminds us, "If Christ is not raised, our faith is futile. But if He is raised, then everything changes" (*Desiring God*, 2011). The resurrection is not merely a doctrine to be believed; it is the defining truth that transforms lives, empowers the Church, and secures our eternal hope.

The evidence is clear. The only question that remains is this: What will you do with it? \checkmark

Remember the pandemic that started in 2019? Whether or not every restriction was helpful, fair, or perfectly applied, a common appeal was made: *do what's best for* the vulnerable, even if it costs you something. That idea—that we can put ourselves second for the good of someone else—cut against the typical individualistic mindset we have in our culture. Similarly, the cross calls us to a different way of life-hidden faithfulness, humility, and a willingness to die to our personal desires. Even outside of Christianity, there's a shared human instinct that sacrificing for others is right. That's not accidental. It's part of the image of God in us. We were made to love in a way that costs us something. The message of Easter doesn't deny that impulse-it fulfills it. In Christ, we're given the clearest vision of sacrificial love, and we're invited to live it out.

The resurrection of Jesus is the *foundation* of Christian faith, the moment history shifted, and death was defeated. But resurrection only comes after death. Before the joy of Easter morning was the agony of the cross. And that pattern—death leading to life—is not just Jesus' story. It's the pattern

He calls every believer to follow.

When Jesus said, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (Luke 9:23), He wasn't offering a metaphor for difficult days or minor sacrifices. He was issuing a call to **die**—to lay down one's entire self in surrender. For those of us trying to make sense of identity, purpose, and calling, this is not a comfortable invitation. But it is a clear one.

The Cross as a Call to Surrender

In an age of self-expression, self-optimization, and personal branding, the idea of self-denial feels foreign, even offensive. We are told to find ourselves, fulfill ourselves, and promote ourselves. But Jesus calls us to deny ourselves. He calls us to surrender not just our bad habits or wrong beliefs but our entire lives—our ambitions, our relationships, our sense of control.

The cross, in Jesus' day, was not symbolic. It was a literal instrument of death. When He said "take up your cross," His disciples understood He was talking about execution. Today, we must hear that call with the same seriousness. To follow Christ is to lay everything at His feet—not as a one-time gesture of emotional devotion, but as a daily act of submission. Jesus didn't die to make our lives more comfortable. He died to make us new.

Gethsemane: The Model of Surrender

Easter weekend begins in the garden, not the tomb. In Gethsemane, Jesus models the essence of surrender: *"Not my will, but yours be done."* He was not indifferent to suffering. He felt the weight of what was coming. He asked for another way. But He submitted to the Father's will, trusting that obedience was better than ease. That moment was not weakness—it was strength rooted in faith.

You live in a world of options, where autonomy is often treated as the highest good. But the Christian life calls us to submit not out of fear or obligation, but because we trust the character of the one we're submitting to. Gethsemane teaches us that surrender is not passive. It is an active choice to trust God's wisdom above our own.

Dying to Self: A Daily Reality Jesus' command includes the word *daily* for a reason. Dying to self is not a decision made once at a retreat or in a moment of emotional clarity. It is a continual posture of the heart. Each day, we are faced with decisions that ask: Will I live for myself, or for Christ?

This might mean sacrificing comfort for integrity, choosing forgiveness over bitterness, walking away from habits that feed the flesh, or staying faithful in places where obedience feels costly. Sometimes, it means letting go of good things—relationships, opportunities, dreams—because

they are not what God is asking of us. This kind of surrender is not always dramatic. Often, it's quiet, internal, and unnoticed. But it is real, and it is transformative.

Resurrection is the Result, Not the Starting Point

The promise of Easter is not that surrender leads to emptiness but that death leads to resurrection. Jesus didn't stay in the tomb—and neither do those who follow Him. The way of the cross is painful, but it is not the end. The author C.S. Lewis puts it this way, "Give up yourself, and you will find your real self. Lose your life and you will save it. ... Nothing in you that has not died will ever be raised from the dead." Christ calls us to die to ourselves because only then can we truly live.

This is not abstract spirituality. It's the concrete reality of Christian discipleship. The life Jesus offers is abundant and eternal—but it requires everything. If we want the life of Christ, we must embrace the way of Christ. And that way always begins with surrender.

Conclusion

The message of Easter is more than a celebration of an event. It's a call to a way of life—a way marked by the cross. For those who are discerning who they are and what they're living for, Easter offers both a challenge and a promise. The challenge: to take up your cross, daily. The promise: that in dying to self, you will find true joy in life—not on your terms, but in Christ.

In a culture chasing self-made identity, the cross stands as an alternative. It calls us to lay everything down—and in doing so, receive everything that matters. *O*



How Kids Can Share Jesus with Their Friends

Easter is a time of joy, celebration, and—most importantly—reflection on the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. As parents, we want our children to understand the meaning behind Easter beyond just egg hunts and chocolate bunnies. But what if Easter egg hunts could actually be a tool to share the Gospel?

Kids are naturally enthusiastic about sharing things they love—whether it's their favorite toy, a fun game, or an exciting story. This Easter, let's equip them to share the greatest story of all: the Good News of Jesus! Here are some fun, hands-on activities to help your child share their faith with friends in a way that's simple, engaging, and impactful.

1. THE "YOU'VE BEEN EGGED" GOSPEL HUNT

Most kids love an Easter egg hunt—so why not turn it into an opportunity to share Jesus? This activity is a fun way for kids to reach out to their friends or neighbors!

How It Works

Supplies Needed:

- 12 plastic eggs per friend
- Candy or small prizes
- A note that says: "You've Been Egged! One egg is empty because Jesus' tomb was empty. He is risen!"

Instructions:

- 1. Help your child fill 11 eggs with candy or small prizes. Leave the 12th egg empty to represent the empty tomb.
- 2. Go to a friend's house, scatter the eggs in their yard, and leave the note on their doorstep.
- 3. Ring the doorbell and run away (or stay to explain if you'd like)!
- 4. Encourage your child to tell their friend what the empty egg means—Jesus is alive!

Faith in Action: This is a great way to spark curiosity and start a conversation about Jesus in a natural, exciting way, and a way to invite their friends to church for Easter.

2. EASTER STORY BRACELETS

Kids love making and wearing bracelets, and this simple craft is a wonderful way to help them share the Gospel using colors.

How to Make an Easter Story Bracelet

Supplies Needed:

- Colored beads:
 - * Black (Sin) We all have sinned (Romans 3:23)
 - Red (Jesus' Blood) Jesus died for our sins (Romans 5:8)
 - * White (Forgiveness) Jesus washes us clean (1 John 1:9)
 - * Blue (Baptism) A new life in Christ (Acts 2:38)
 - * Green (Growing in Faith) We grow in Jesus (2 Peter 3:18)
 - * Gold (Heaven) The promise of eternal life (John 3:16)
- Elastic string

Instructions:

- 1. Have your child string the beads in the order above, explaining what each color means.
- 2. Encourage them to make extra bracelets and give them to friends while explaining the meaning behind the colors.
- 3. When someone asks about the bracelet, they can share the Easter story!

Faith in Action: This activity helps kids confidently share their faith in a fun and creative way!

3. GOSPEL EGG TOSS

This is a simple outdoor game that helps kids remember key parts of the Easter story while having fun with their friends.

Supplies Needed:

- Plastic eggs (1 per child)
- Small slips of paper with Bible verses about Jesus' death and resurrection
- A basket or bucket

How to Play:

- 1. Write short Bible verses about Jesus' sacrifice and resurrection on small slips of paper (or use simple phrases like "Jesus died for us" and "Jesus is alive!").
- 2. Place one slip inside each plastic egg and close it.
- 3. Have kids stand in a line and take turns tossing their eggs into a basket.
- 4. When they make a shot, they open their egg, read the message inside, and explain what it means.

Faith in Action: This game reinforces key Easter truths while keeping kids engaged and excited about sharing Jesus!

Final Thoughts

Helping kids share their faith doesn't have to be intimidating—it can be as simple as an egg hunt, a bracelet, or a fun game. By providing them with creative tools and handson activities, we empower them to talk about Jesus with confidence.

As parents, let's encourage our children to share the true meaning of Easter with their friends. Whether through a surprise egg hunt, a colorful bracelet, or an egg toss, these small moments of faith-sharing can plant seeds that last a lifetime. This Easter, let's not just celebrate Jesus—we can share Him too!
